Mumbulla School Land Purchase

We are thrilled to share some exciting news with you! The Board and College of Mumbulla School for Rudolf Steiner Education are delighted to announce that we have successfully acquired the adjacent block of land from the Spotlight Group. This new addition is approximately 2.6 hectares, with around 100 meters of street frontage on Bega St. You might remember that we also acquired the land for our new Kindergarten from the Spotlight Group back in 2020.

This latest acquisition means that we no longer have to worry about a major developer moving in next door, which may not align with our educational values. Now, with a total of 4.8 hectares (about 12 acres) of land, we have even more opportunities for growth and development.

We're in the process of reviewing potential uses for this land. It will need some remediation to meet

school zoning requirements, and we'll be working closely with the Council and environmental experts to determine the best way forward. Our Master Planning Group will be exploring all the possibilities and in due course will present their recommendations for approval to both the College and the Board.

This new block opens up so many exciting possibilities for our school's future. We're particularly excited about the chance to collaborate with local community groups like BRAWL to enhance the embankment along Spenco Lagoon.

Thank you for being a part of this wonderful journey with us. We look forward to sharing more updates and working together to make the most of this incredible opportunity for our Mumbulla School community.

Council rehabilitation works along Bega River

Willow control along Bega River

In June 2024, Council engaged Blackwood River Restoration willow control work along the stretch between the Brogo/Bega River Junction downstream to the Tarraganda Bridge. This project follows up a control program run by the Local Land Services (former Catchment Authority), with the initial control occurring in 2000 and follow up sweeps in 2007 and approximately 2017. The purpose of the original control works was to reduce in-stream blockages, causing bank erosion and flow diversion, primarily into the Anabranch channel. The control work was successful and is a great example of a willow-free section of river. Unfortunately, box elder seedlings in the river channel and riverbanks pose a much greater future problem than willows ever did. Box elder is considerably harder to control than willow. The initial quote to treat the box elder in this section of the river is \$30,000. Currently this is cost prohibitive.

East Street weed control

In June 2024, Council undertook weed control works along the East Street revegetation area targeting broad-leaf and small-leaf Privet (*Ligustrum lucidum and L. sinense*), Blackberry (*Rubus fruticosus*), and Box Elder (*Acer negundo*). Target weeds were mulched in-situ leaving thin mulch layer across the surface.

The reserve has a rich history of rehabilitation and serves as an ongoing collaboration between council, state government, schools, landcare and community groups. The initial revegetation of this former sand quarry site was led by Council in collaboration with (then) Catchment Management Authority in 2002. Over the years, ongoing support and further revegetation projects within the area have been managed by the former On-Trac committee, BRAWL, BVSC, Local Land Services, and Mumbulla school. BRAWL installed nest boxes throughout the reserve to enhance its habitat value, and recent camera monitoring revealed sugar glider families residing there. If left unchecked, these weed species would undo the revegetation efforts previously done and significantly degrade the habitat quality.

Council will run a community and schools tree planting days once the weather warms.

Trad fungal smut biocontrol

Recently I was walking in the East Street rehabilitation site, and I happened upon the CSIRO Trad smut trial site. The smut is really evident (see photos). The trad is still the dominant ground cover but not as tall and lush as other sites.

CSIRO confirmed that these observations are consistent with theirs. The fungus has become well established along the Bega River and that it is slowly reducing the vigour of the weed without wiping it out altogether. CSIRO experiments certainly have shown that the competitive strength of the weed is reduced when severely infected by the fungus. Even though the weed may not be completely removed, it should alleviate the pressure on native plants growing nearby within the same root zone.



Platypus Corner


This project is completed, and the final report has been submitted to Council. It is my calculation that the project was overspent \$43, however the financials are still yet to be acquitted. If this overspend is correct, this can be absorbed in BRAWL's \$450 auspice fee. Part of the difficulty in costing was that the LALC did not invoice for over 8months, and when they did, it was the day before the final report was due. Dave has forwarded a copy of this final report to BRAWL and has indicated that he will submit a more detailed report to BRAWL at a later date.


Participation Summary


